Program

Our February program will feature Art Thell, WØIWQ, speaking on “Smoke Signals to Cellphones (almost),” a dissertation on some of the basic developments, methods, and processes that have made our present communication systems possible.

Dale’s Details – Dale Maroushek NØPEY

Well the shack is cooling down a bit after the big build up to the Auction last month. I’ll first send out a huge thank you to the staff of volunteers that planned it, practiced it and executed it. Then we must thank the fine crop of bidders and sellers that took the time to bring in the gear and spend big money, allowing it to change hands, rather than landing in a dumpster. I don’t have the final figures yet, but I say it was another success.

All meetings are in the Commons meeting room in the John R Albers Center at Cretin-Derham Hall High School, 555 Hamline Ave. S., St. Paul MN 55116. From the intersection of Randolph Avenue and Hamline Avenue S., take Hamline southward for 3 blocks. The parking lot entrance is on the west side of Hamline Ave. opposite Watson St. The Albers Center building is about 400 feet west of the lot entrance—use the double-door entrance on the east side of the building.

What I do know and can report on. Sixty-eight bidder number were issued, but 4 of those were not bidders, sellers only, slightly down from previous years. There were 191 lots up for auction, not broken down between silent and live. Of those, 157 were sold or 82%. There were 5 partial estates including gear donated to SPRC from previous years. The larger the gear, the better the deal in dollar value. The smaller and older the gear, the better the deal in personal value. As usual, bidders are hard to get started, but once going, they bid competitively.

Summing it up, we completed another successful auction and will be making our donation to the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund soon. One more special “Thank you” goes out to the lunch lady, my wife Deb, for faithfully staffing the food table all these years.

So what’s coming up? Hamfests every month, meetings, breakfasts and VE testing weekly, someplace in the metro area. MNQP will be over, hope you had a chance to operate. If you did, and collected MN ops from many counties, you may be on your way to

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start working on your Worked all MN Counties Award. Rich, WD0K, has been working on a more up to date (computer based) process to handle it and will be reporting back to the Club soon.

April will bring in the next Banquet. Our search for a speaker continues, as does our selection of the Ham of the Year. Any suggestions or nominations, tell us. More nominations or volunteers will be needed at the May meeting to campaign for the election of officer positions. Then, never too early to start the excitement, before you know it the end of June arises and Field Day is here. June 27/28, the FOURTH FULL weekend, not the last weekend. Last year this was confusing since we crowded in five full weekends which made FD very early on the 22nd. Doesn't happen very often, but plan your vacations carefully.

I'm getting back with Lou the photo guy next week to get his HT's programmed and hitting the repeaters. I ordered in some more Bao Fang gear to complete the programming capabilities and cloning of these cheap radios. I spent a few hours figuring out the CHIRP and BF programming steps, which I'm sure I can still improve on, but we can get him started back on the air. He also has a couple of FT-470's that have bad voodoo and act completely different under the same circumstances. They may have to visit Gary Grivna, K0GX, for some TLC. An outside antenna is the key to this, and I may have picked one up at the Auction!

The column can't end without the usual begging for volunteers to get involved in a method of their own choosing, to become the leadership of the Club into the future. There are seven Board members and about 20 other members that are doing the management work needed to keep things going. Most are between 55 and 80 years old, with a few younger ones with club spirit. We need our younger generation to come forward and learn. Believe me, you will have the support of the entire current staff to ease your mind, advance your education and guide you into a fantastic club experience. Building Blocks – Jay Maher NJØM

Movement does a body good and most of us should do more of it. It is difficult in the winter when my bikes see less use. Over the frozen months, my primary activity is walking, with much of it on a track at the local Y. The track is a sixth of a mile long, but it still feels like a hamster wheel going round and round. Podcasts are my salvation.

One of my favorite amateur radio podcasts is QSO Today, hosted by Eric Guth 4Z1UG/WA6IGR. Every week he interviews a member of the amateur radio community and posts it on his website along with show notes and links (www.qsotoday.com). Eric follows a regular format, usually starting people off at the beginning of their ham radio experience, and the conversations are fascinating. There are close to 300 episodes to choose from now. I gravitate toward the homebrewers in the list, but I've also gotten glimpses of aspects of the hobby I would've never encountered without this podcast. They will make an hour walking in circles or shoveling your (and all your neighbors')

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sidewalks go by in a flash.

The SolderSmoke podcast was the first podcast I listened to after getting licensed in Spring 2007. Bill Meara, MØHBR/N2CQR, and Mike Caughran, KL7R (SK), started recording and posting their EchoLink conversations about homebrewing in 2005. At the time, Bill was stationed in London and Mike lived in Juneau, Alaska. Their sessions covered whatever they might have on the bench and were less structured than QSO Today podcasts. I only recently heard the episodes with Mike, as I started listening to SolderSmoke after he was tragically killed in a car accident while vacationing in Hawaii in January 2007. Going back to those early 2005-2006 episodes last fall, it was fun to hear Mike give a shout out to local homebrew hero Craig Johnson, AAØZZ, about help he'd given Mike with the PIC-EL. In another installment, Mike mentioned an EDN Design Idea about an audible circuit tracer that varied in tone with the quality of the circuit path. I searched that article out and made a note to revisit the circuit when time allowed. There are over 200 episodes now, and of the ones I have heard, nearly all have left me with something I want to follow up or that I'm inspired to try (soldersmoke.blogspot.com).

I mentioned that EDN Design Idea circuit for a reason. When I searched it out last fall, the EDN site pulled up the 2003 article and you could click and get a schematic and pdf copy. Going back recently, the link to the schematic and pdf returned errors. The Internet Wayback Machine did not have a copy. Bitten by not following my own advice to save things locally! I did finally locate a copy of the schematic on another website and saved it promptly to my computer. As is normally the case when searching the internet, I bumped into several other interesting things along the way. Though the good people at archive.org (home of the Wayback Machine) did not have the EDN article schematic, I recently found they have archive issues of QEX magazine from 1982-2016 - very handy. They also have a pdf copy of Solid State Design for the Radio Amateur (one of Bill Meara's favorites so you'll hear about it if you listen to SolderSmoke). I have a collection of old radio texts myself, but here is someone who has made it a mission to save them - http://www.tubebooks.org/technical_books_online.htm. If you have made it this far, you have the stamina to crunch through some dusty material. Take advantage of these dark days to read or listen!

Sorry I missed the Auction. Sounds like a good time was had by all. I have been doing some computer work this month. I doubled the memory in my laptop to 16Gb to perk up its performance on Lightroom and Photoshop, which it did. An added benefit is that it perked up my work on the *Ground Wave* when I often have to have Publisher and Word open at the same time. I developed a roll of film last month which I hadn't done in a while. It was fun to smell the chemicals and see the images on the film. I don't

have a darkroom set up, so I scanned the negatives into my computer and worked on them with Lightroom.

I have also been studying up on the architecture of my old Zenith Z-100. The Z-100 was unique in that it had two processors: an 8085 for CP/M and an 8088 for DOS. I am looking to do some C programming on the DOS side and assembler programming on the CP/M side.

I also continue to work on my chess game with a "Great Courses" class (which is excellent) and the Stockfish computer engine.

Dale mentioned the free "CHIRP" handheld programming software. I am on a Facebook Yaesu page and a Yaesu factory rep says using CHIRP on Yaesu radios voids the warranty and they will not attempt to repair radios programmed with CHIRP. Pretty harsh, so there must be something to it. So be forewarned: you get what you pay for. By the way, they recommend ADMS software, which will cost you \$30-40 depending on whether you need a cable. So using CHIRP on your \$40 Baofeng is probably ok, but I wouldn't risk it on your Yaesu. I'd be curious what Kenwood and Icom say.
